# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **OUR BUSINESS:**

Amman, Jordan, is a vibrant and multicultural city in the heart of the Levant, that has long been a stronghold for arts, culture and metropolitan trade. According to UNHCR, at the end of 2019," the number of refugees registered in Jordan currently stands at 744,795 persons of concern,655,000 Syrians, 67,000 Iraqis, 15,000 Yemenis, 6,000 Sudanis and 2,500 refugees from a total of 52 other nationalities," including other countries in the Middle East North Africa (MENA) region. Due to this influx, there is a strong need for creative outlets, that create a platform for often 'unheard' voices, and awareness around the multifaceted experience of contemporary MENA life, for both migrants and non-migrants.

Our collective aims to participate in inspiring social cohesion and contribute to the ongoing conversations between migrant and non-migrant communities. Our aim is to enhance social cohesion in Amman, through the use of applied arts practices, mainly through the mediums of theatre, radio plays and music. Applied arts practices have proven to be an incredibly useful tool to not only provide a platform for often 'unheard' voices, but to create a space for participants to share their concerns on social cohesion, regional conflicts, and intergenerational disparities, and to share those with a larger audience, ultimately resulting in increased global awareness.

#### **Objectives:**

- To promote social cohesion between migrants and non-migrants through fun and engaging applied arts workshops where they can establish meaningful connections both with each other and within the communities they reside
- To explore popular theatrical plays, in both western and eastern canons, utilizing literary themes as a lense through which to explore contemporary MENA region topics
- To encourage dialogue and awareness surrounding these issues, incorporating a larger English speaking audience, by offering our productions (podcasts, virtual performances etc.) in English and Arabic

Specific services we will offer in order to achieve these objectives include:

• Creative podcasts, with radio dramas: Our first project "Our Voices/ اصواتنا" will create a space for participants to take part in dramatic readings of Arabic and English plays by

eastern and western authors, followed by detailed talk back sessions from guest expert speakers, aiming at exploring contemporary MENA region topics through the lens of literature

- Music jam nights mixed with "Hakawati" dramatic storytelling, to raise money for our projects as well as highlight the skills of local up-and-coming artists in Amman
- Creative workshops for corporations, community centres, organisations and ministries, which promote inclusion and collaboration in the workplace, neighbourhood or community, focused on the deconstruction of stereotypes surrounding complex migrant, and minority identities, delivered in any of the languages we offer
- Training workshops (TOT) for teachers, facilitators, artists, corporations or anyone who wishes to equip themselves with skills to promote the inclusion of migrants, refugees and minorities in their workplaces
- Productions by workshop participants
- An online platform for participants to share their unique stories utilizing creative writing techniques preceded by workshops with creative writing specialists

#### What differentiates us from our competitors:

- We are looking at a holistic and inclusive approach, through opening up workshops to non-migrants, involving them in dialogue to deconstruct preconceived notions and prejudices around foreign migrants
- Our approach will be not only intercultural but also intergenerational
- We speak English and Arabic, and have members that are natively fluent in both
- We are a diverse group, consisting of migrants and non-migrants
- Business aims:
- Short term (one year):
  - Establish our collective within Amman, and become a registered charity in Canada/ and or Amman
  - Produce our first project, "Our Voices/ اصواتنا
  - Develop and establish sustainability with a donor base
  - See an increase in our number of participants
  - Establish collaborative partnerships with related companies/businesses/organisations, both in Amman and abroad

- Generate sufficient income to start seeing returns on our personal investments
- Be a recognisably unique and sought-after collective
- Offer our workshops in more languages, and expand to more countries
- Stage, podcast and virtual productions involving the creative work of our participants
